LEE SURRENDERS ARMY AT APPOMATTOX GRANT OFFERS GENEROUS CONDITIONS



Pictured above is a panoramic image of the reconstructed parlor of the McLean House at Appomattox Court House. Ulysses S. Grant sat at the simple wooden table on the right, while Robert E. Lee sat at the more ornate marble-topped table on the left. The battle at dawn on April 9, 1865 had been brief with less than 700 soldiers killed, small compared to the hundreds of thousands dead by this time. Lee had hoped to push Union cavalry aside and head for Lynchburg and supplies. But as John Gordon's 2nd Corps broke through the cavalry, it was confronted by Union infantry which had come up during the early morning hours. "Tell General Lee I have fought my Corps to a frazzle and I fear I can do nothing....." When Lee received this message, he stated the inevitable. "Then there is nothing left for me to do but to go and see General Grant and I would rather die a thousand deaths." At 8:00 a.m. Lee rode out with three aides to meet Grant.

CDCWRT MEETING

The March meeting of the Capital District Civil War Round Table will be held on Friday, March 8, 2013. This meeting will be held at the Watervliet Senior Center, 1541 Broadway in Watervliet. Our honored guest speaker will be Catherine M. Wright, curator at The Museum of the Confederacy in Richmond, VA. Her presentation is entitled “Lee’s Last Casualty: The Life and Letters of Robert Parker.”

The letters of Sgt. Robert Parker, 2nd Virginia Cavalry, provide a window into the daily life of an enlisted cavalryman, as well as highlight the unique story of the soldier believed to be the last man killed in action in the Army of Northern Virginia. In many ways, Parker was representative of the average Confederate soldier: a modest farmer in the antebellum years, his patriotic fervor spurred him at the beginning of the war to enlist in the Confederate cavalry.

His letters reveal how home front and battlefield were closely intertwined, and the importance of correspondence in sustaining that connection and the will to fight. The role of the cavalry and Parker’s tragic death are also highlighted in the program.

Catherine was born in Kansas City, MO, and grew up there and in Norfolk, VA. She received her bachelor’s degrees in English and History from Truman State University (2003), and a master’s degree in American History with a concentration in museum studies from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro (2006).

She is the editor of Lee’s Last Casualty: The Life and Letters of Sgt. Robert W. Parker, Second Virginia Cavalry (University of Tennessee Press 2008) and is a contributing historian to the online Encyclopedia of Virginia. Various national media outlets have interviewed her, including NPR and CNN, and she has appeared on the PBS program “History Detectives” and twice on the Travel Channel program “Mysteries of the Museum.” She was formerly the curator at the Stonewall Jackson House in Lexington, VA.
